What does the LHIN do?

LHIN = Local Health Integration Network

Our network is one of 14 Local Health Integration Networks

(LHINs) established in 2006 by the Government of Ontario in order to plan, fund, and monitor health care services at the local level.

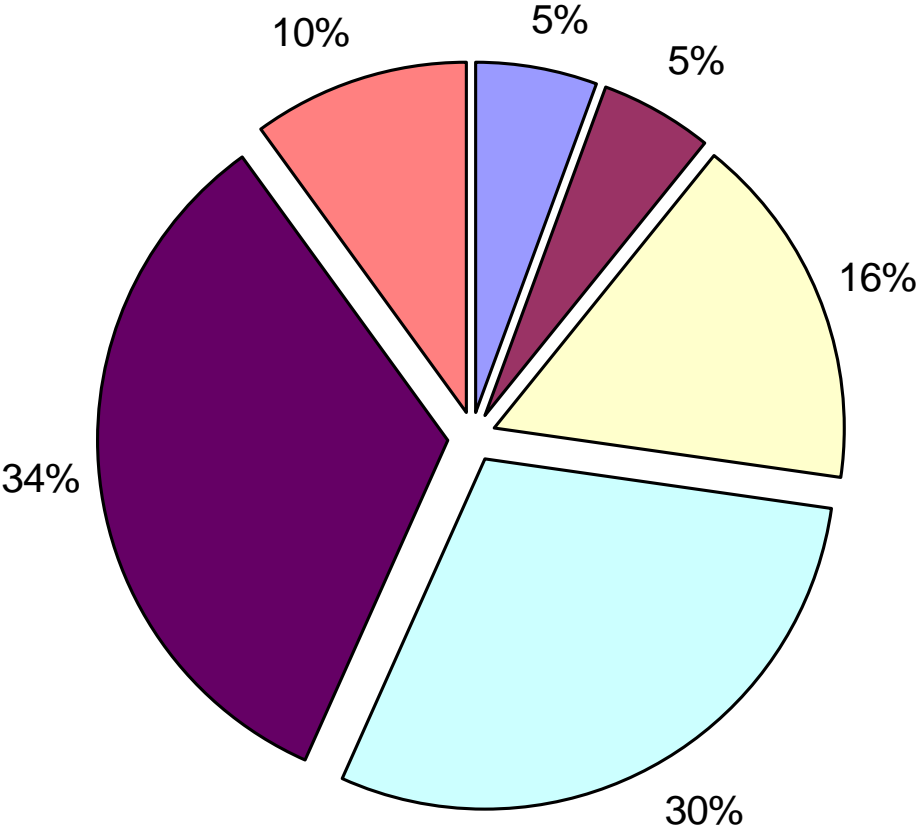
Each LHIN is unique

Current Population by Sub-LHIN Area

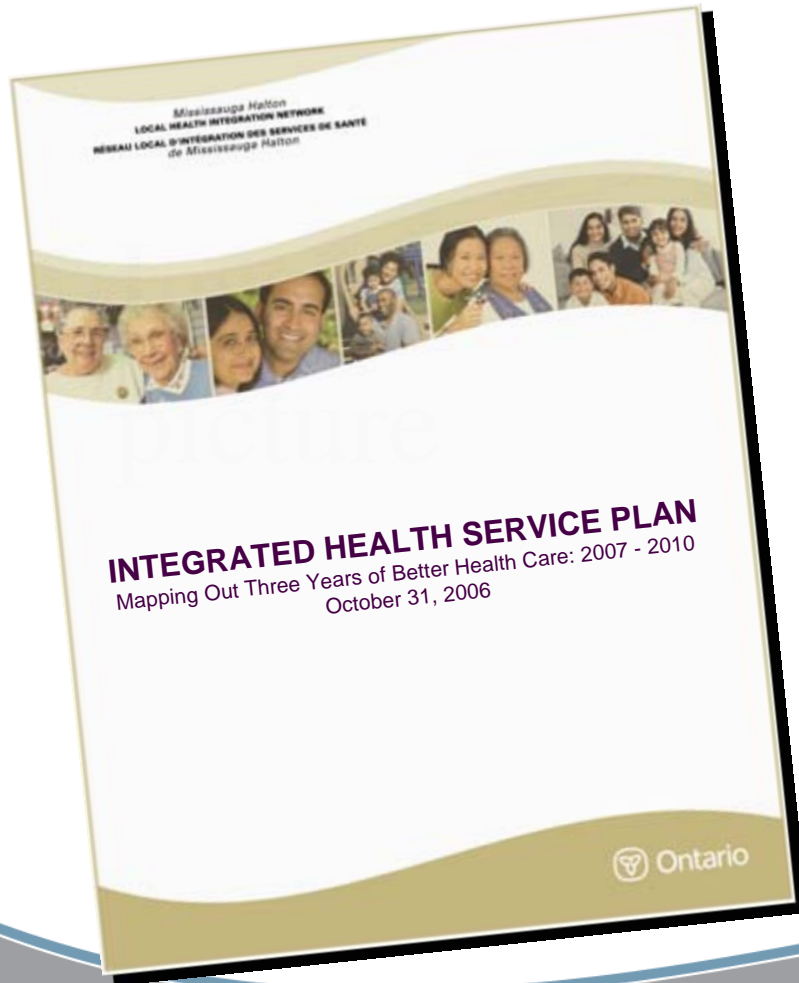

IHSP Refresh

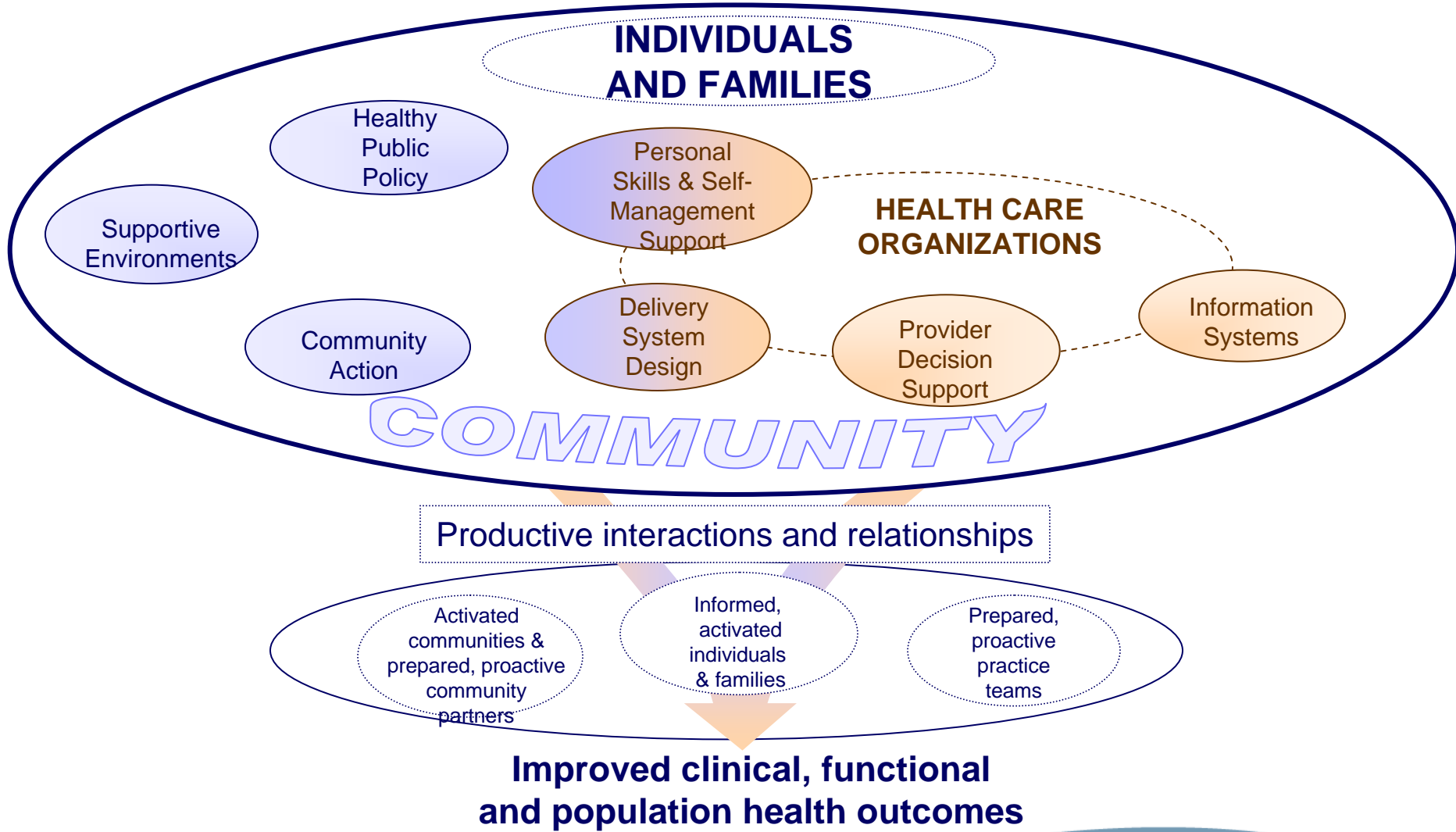
- All LHINs are embarking on a refresh →2010/11 to 2012/13
- Build upon existing work underway; greater focus on defining the integration priorities
- Targeted community engagement approach: lead Diane Koz
- Align with the government's health care priorities:
 - Reduce Wait Times, especially in ERs
 - Improving access to family health care
 - Include a focus on chronic disease i.e. diabetes



CDPM Team

- Established a CDPM Team with reps from various networks, organizations, sectors and of voluntary members from the community (geography, providers, patient)
- Adopted the Ontario CDPM Framework as our guide
- Build upon the work of various disease based networks and organizations
 - Self-Management
 - Access to diabetes education -> co-morbidities
